












### **Ramadan, Easter and Eid Celebrations**

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#### **Geography News**

On Tuesday 20th February the Geography department took a group of 96 year 8 students to Twycross Zoo for the day. Students took part in a tour of the zoo where they practised their research skills, utilising zoo signage to create a fact file focusing upon animal endangerment and conservation globally.

All students attended a workshop run by zoo staff where they discussed causes of animal extinction and worked in small groups to create their own area of conservation. They were encouraged to consider ways in which their conservation could

sustainably mitigate threats to local wildlife, considering the long-term impact of the local biodiversity.


### **Geography Club (Friday Lunchtime - 1SS1)**

#### Polar Network Flag Competition

Well done to Beatrice S (9DPA) who created a unique flag using software she learnt to use within her IT lessons at school. The flag had moving features and the flags of all nations who have signed the Antarctic treaty, promising to protect the area from invasion and exploitation.

After sending her flag to the UK Polar Network, we received an image of her flag out on South Georgia Island, Antarctica with Carrie Gunn. Below is a little information about Carrie and her amazing work as a British Antarctic Survey Marine Biologist studying a colony of Gentoo penguins on the island.

'The colony has around 1131 chicks this year and 50 of these get weighed when they are 98 days old. Their weights give us an idea of how well fed they have been this season. Yesterday's results showed that the average weight of a chick was 5.3kg which is higher than our long-term average of 4.9kg. So there must be some good feeding grounds available to their parents this season. The chicks will fledge in the next few weeks and the colonies will go quiet for the winter season'.

Letters have been sent out to those students who filled in the interest google form, however, if any additional students would like to join us, then please drop me an email and I will look at adding you to the system.



### Leave of Absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent (s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

**It is important to note**, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
