At the start of January, some of our Year 8 students visited the University of Warwick to take part in an outreach and widening participation event delivered by the School of Modern Languages and Cultures to schools from the Coventry and Birmingham areas. The event was based on the 2024 Olympic Games and encourages students to:



- Explore the values associated with the Olympic Games.
- Decode the cultural symbols associated with the 2024 Olympic mascot.
- Investigate debates around the Olympics and inclusivity.

The day kicked off with a warm welcome and a tour of the main campus. From the Warwick Arts Centre to state-of-the-art facilities, our students had the opportunity to get a first-hand look at the vibrant academic environment that fosters innovation and learning.

The students were immersed in a series of sessions and workshops. From discussing the history of the Olympics to exploring the significance of the Olympic values, the students were able to broaden their understanding of both the French language and the global sporting stage.

A highlight of the day was a collaborative project where students worked in small groups to create and present their own slogan and logo for the forthcoming 2030 Winter Olympics in the French Alps. This has not only challenged

their language abilities but also encouraged teamwork, creativity, and public speaking. The diversity of ideas and the enthusiasm displayed by each group truly show cased the spirit of the Olympics in action. The event not only reinforced the importance of language education but also highlighted the power of cultural exploration in

shaping well-rounded individuals.

We look forward to more opportunities for our students to engage in such enriching experiences that go beyond the classroom and open doors to a world of knowledge and cultural understanding.





















Forest Schools News

Forest Schools students have been very busy this month.

Students had the opportunity to build dens at Sherwood Pines and learnt all about surviving in the outdoors. They were all very creative and worked as a team to ensure everyone was safe and had a secure den. We learnt all about the veteranisation process and identified which trees this naturally occurred to and how this process helped wildlife thrive.



We also took an 8 mile walk around Draycote Water and did a spot of birdwatching. Students saw blue tits, bullfinch, divers (rare to the inland) and a woodpecker. We stopped off at Toft Farm in Dunchurch to see the Alpacas on our way back. The students found the alpacas to be friendly, inquisitive and very fluffy.


A small group of students have been visiting the stables in Grandborough and learning how to look after and care for the horses and also how to ride.

Leave of Absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

Careers News

What's been happening this month:

Over 60 Year 11 students have visited Rugby Free School for interviews as part of the application process for the Sixth form. They represented the school well. Many will receive conditional offers to study at RFSS in the near future.

Twenty year 10 students visited SUEZ Waste recovery plant, Malpass Farm, Rugby. They heard from Scott Bradshaw, Production Operations Manager, about the waste recovery process. We had a tour of the site and a talk about the potential career opportunities within SUEZ and the many sustainable features of the site. This will form part of a case study for their GCSE Geography exam.



A class of Year 7 students had a visitor in their technology lessons. Jodie was a former AVS student who went to Rugby College to study engineering. Her studies were interrupted by Covid, but she has

now become the first Rugby College student to complete her degree in engineering at the college. She spoke to students about her pathway into engineering and the challenges she faced in a male dominated industry.

AVS Work experience (WEX)

This year WEX is from Monday 1st to Friday 5th July. It is the responsibility of students to find a placement. To assist them with this challenge, they have now written a letter to send to local employers. Once a placement has been agreed in principle, the name of the company and contact details are to be passed to Mrs Demaj who will then carry out the Safeguarding and Health & Safety checks before confirming the placement.
