English Curriculum News

In KS3, Year 7 are currently exploring a range of non-fiction texts in their 'Travel Writing' unit where they are reading a range of extracts ranging from Bill Bryson Notes from a Small Island to travel brochures on Thailand before completing their own extended pieces.

Year 8 are studying the modern play 'Noughts and Crosses' based on Malorie Blackman's novel. They will read and study the play in English before having the exciting opportunity, later in the year, to work on the text in their Drama lessons.

Meanwhile, Year 9 have been busy settling into their short stories unit where they are exploring a challenging range of texts ranging from the dramatic monologue 'Your Shoes' by Michelle Roberts to 'The Yellow Wallpaper' by Charlotte Perkins Gilman and The Tell Tale Heart by Edgar Allan Poe.

In KS4, Year 10 have left summer well and truly behind them and have launched headfirst into the festive favourite 'A Christmas Carol' which is one of their AQA GCSE English Literature texts. Recent lessons have seen students completing a character analysis of Scrooge. Meanwhile, Year 11 have started their English Language GCSE course with gusto and have just completed their first assessment for English Language Paper 2 Section A, where they read and analysed two non-fiction extracts in timed conditions.

As part of Black History Month, the students took part in the 'Great Big Live Assembly' which was streamed live on October 10th 2023. The theme of the special assembly for Black History Month was 'celebrating sisters' and was dedicated to showcasing some of the stories of amazing Black women who have made our world a better place.



The UK-wide 20-minute virtual assembly connected more than 500 schools simultaneously and involved around 300,000 young people. 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Leave of Absence

The Supreme Court recently reached a decision in the case of Platt v Isle of Wight Council which has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time. The parents of children of compulsory school age are required to ensure that they attend school on a regular basis. The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

Head Teachers retain the ability to authorise leave in accordance with the Education (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. When considering such requests for a leave of absence, the school are obliged to act within the law. Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances relating to the application. If the leave is granted, head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for leave in advance can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.

Dropping off and picking up students

We would like to remind parents and carers about the arrangements for dropping off and collecting students from school.

Where possible we recommend that students walk, use a bike or school bus to get to/from school. Car sharing is useful as it helps to reduce the volume of traffic.

In the morning, our gates are open from 8.20am until 8.50am allowing parents to drive onto the school site to drop students off in our turning circle. Students should arrive between 8.20am and 8.40am, and must be in their tutor room no later than 8.45am.

In the afternoon, the school day ends at 3.10pm. Unfortunately, it is not possible to allow cars onto the school site as this causes a traffic build up on Newbold Road, prevents buses from accessing the site, and poses a danger to our students as they leave school. Therefore, parents and carers should not enter the school site to collect their child; we suggest families pre-arrange a safe and convenient place to meet their child at the end of the day.

If using a car is essential, we ask that you park safely and are mindful of the people who live nearby. To help ease congestion, you may consider dropping your child off slightly further away, allowing them to walk a short stretch of their journey. A suggested drop-off point can be found below.

If your child walks to/from school, we encourage you to please take a few minutes to remind them about their safety, such as sticking to paths and using designated crossing points. If your child uses a bike, we recommend that a safety helmet is worn, lights are used as needed, and that the bike is secured with a strong lock throughout the day. Electronic scooters should not be used to travel to school and are banned from the school site.

Ultimately, keeping our students safe is our first priority. Bearing in mind the dangers vehicles present, we ask that if you do use a car to transport your child to, or from, school, that you do so safely, responsibly, and considerately.



Arts Awards

At the beginning of term, Year 10 students have received notification of their success on the Bronze Arts Award programme.

During Year 9, the students, who are now in Year 10, had performing arts lessons dedicated to the Bronze Arts Award. Following the submission of their portfolios, 167 students will receive the award certificate.



The Bronze Arts Award, is designed for students aged 11-14 years, and

aims to develop young people's artistic abilities alongside their research and communication skills. The award involves students in the arts as creators and audience members, and encourages them to take their first steps towards leadership by sharing their learning with others.

As part of the arts awards, students specialise and learn about dance, drama, and art, completing both practical work and research task which helps them develop a range of skills and builds confidence.

Blake Francis, headteacher, said, "It is brilliant to see such a large number of students achieving the arts award. Offering the arts award in Year 9 helps ensure our students can enjoy, and can benefit from being offered, a broad curriculum. It also underlines and supports The Avon Valley School's commitment to the performing arts, which is a longstanding part of the school's ethos and history. For many of the students this is the first formal qualification they've ever received, and will no doubt be the first of many."







Road Saftey

Incidents like this do remind us all about how important it is to stay safe on the journey to and from school.

Please can I ask you to talk to your child about how to be safe when travelling to and from school and remind them about cycling safety, if they travel by bicycle.
